

Triantafillos J. (Lakis) Mountziaris is a Professor of Chemical Engineering at the University of Massachusetts-Amherst. He earned a Diploma (5-year degree) with highest honors from the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki, Greece, and a PhD from Princeton University, both in Chemical Engineering. After completing postdoctoral studies in the Department of Chemical Engineering and Materials Science at the University of Minnesota he started his academic career at the State University of New York at Buffalo (SUNY), where he spent sixteen years as a faculty member in the Department of Chemical and Biological Engineering (1989-2005). From 2003 to 2005 he served as Program Director for Particulate and Multiphase Processes at the National Science Foundation of the United States and subsequently joined the Department of Chemical Engineering at the University of Massachusetts-Amherst as Professor and Department Head. He is currently serving as Program Director for Process Systems, Reaction Engineering and Molecular Thermodynamics at the National Science Foundation. His research interests include reaction engineering and reactor design, synthesis of electronic and photonic materials, biosensors, and multi-phase flows. He is the recipient of several honors and awards, including the Norman Hackerman Award of the Electrochemical Society, The Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching from the SUNY system, and Visiting Professorships from ETH-Zurich and Princeton University. Two of his patents on nanocrystal synthesis have been licensed by a startup company.
